About the FFA

Fahrten-Ferne-Abenteuer is a nationwide recognized actor in youth welfare service in Germany (according to Kinder- und Jugendhilfegesetz § 75). We conduct a wide variety of activities of nonformal education using the Adventure Based Learning methodology (international youth exchanges, trainings for youth leaders and adventure based learning activities for the local community, in particular children, youth groups, school classes and non-formal groups of young people). Our programme includes teambuilding activities, climbing, high ropes courses, raftbuilding and professional orientation for school classes alongside trainings for various propagators (youth leaders, integration projects). Our EVS volunteers are included in the preparation, implementation and evaluation of those activities. Additionally, they can assist us within our international network of youth organisations "CityBound Europe", implementing adventure based learning in international youth exchanges. EVS and in particular the hosting of EVS volunteers enables us to include an added european aspect to our work and potential future volunteers. About the project

Over the last years in Europe, antisemitism has become a notorious problem not only in Germany but almost in every country, reaching further and more young people. By stereotypes, prejudices and discrimination, with permanent online access, haters can abuse their targets in new ways, making children affected as victims, perpetrators and/or bystanders. Later we can notice spreading hate and bias thinking in news and on the streets as a modern type of propaganda. In social psychology, a stereotype is an over-generalized belief about a particular category of people. Stereotypes are generalized because one assumes that the stereotype is true for each individual person in the category. While such generalizations may be useful when making quick decisions, they may be erroneous when applied to particular individuals. Stereotypes lead to social categorisation, which is one of the reasons for prejudice attitudes, and may arise for a number of reasons. One of them is antisemitism - as such started well before WW2 and Holocaust, with main events happening in motherland of Nazi movement. Initiation, actions, process and finally punishment took place in Bavaria, mainly between Nuremberg and Munich. With demons of the past returning in these days.

The overall aim of the exchange is to bring young people from different countries together to get enough knowledge about antisemitism issue; to share/learn current situations in different countries and its effects on our societies, discuss about how European Institutions and our countries are tackling it and creating tools to increase awareness about this issue.

About the project

Because of this, we would like to implement our project not only for young people but also by young people as using nonformal educational methods and activities to achieve the following specific objectives:

- To learn/discuss different definitions of discrimination and increase awareness on what is discrimination and what is not,
- To develop critical thinking regarding the information of antisemitism phenomenon and to understand how hate speech affect people/children in our societies,
- To increase the understanding of prejudice issues and how it affects people of all races, ethnicities, religions, and gender;
- To be aware of the importance of diversity in local, regional and international level and to develop skills and attitudes to motivate and actively involve our young people in international youth projects as preventing hate speeches and discrimination (especially propaganda),
- To raise positive awareness of human rights, tolerance, active and its value for youth through cultural dialog between youngsters from four different countries;
 - To identify and share similarities & differences in practices used in different countries in terms of antisemitism/discrimination/stereotypes,
 - To promote the active participation of young people against language of hate,
- To develop a critical approach towards exclusion based on their own experiences, skills, beliefs, and values,
- To develop participants' skills in critical thinking regarding preventing antisemitism/discrimination,
- To strengthen understanding of consequences of abusing humans and human rights based on recent (XX century) history in Nazi Germany.

Costs


Accommodation
